Abstract:

This collection consists of the records of Rochester, New York based beauty pioneer, Martha Matilda Harper. The material date between 1889 and 1968, with the bulk of materials dated between 1920 and 1960. The materials consist of photographs, *Harper Method Progress* newsletters, publications, newspaper articles, moving images, shop directories, training publications, and advertisements.

Biographical/Historical Note

Martha Matilda Harper, known as a pioneer in the beauty industry, was born on September 10, 1857 in the village of Munn's Corners, just north of Oakville, Ontario, Canada. Martha, one of ten children born to Robert and Beadie (Gifford) Harper, was sent off to live with a very prosperous uncle, as a servant, at the age of seven. At the age of twelve Martha began employment with a doctor as his housekeeper. The doctor taught Martha about the physiology of hair and how to obtain healthy growth of hair through scalp cleanliness and stimulation. It was from the doctor that Martha learned would obtain the secret herbal hair tonic formula that would empower her to create the first United States retail franchise business for hair and skin care.

Martha Left Canada in 1882 and moved to Rochester, New York, where she became a servant for the Hovey family. When the house was sold, Martha remained as a servant to the new owners, the Robert's. Martha's first laboratory for the manufacture of her trademark hair tonic was in the carriage shed of this home on East Main Street.

Rochester in the late 1800's was a city full of confidence and a spirit of determination. It was home to women activists such as Susan B. Anthony as well as many women's social and political clubs. It was an environment where Martha could develop her independent nature and apply her strong work ethic to an innovative business adventure.

1888 was a milestone year for the city of Rochester with the invention of the Kodak camera by George Eastman. It was also the year that Martha took her life savings of \$360 and opened up the first beauty salon for women, located in the prestigious Powers building in downtown Rochester. Martha, using good business sense, had sought out a location where she could attract the social elite of Rochester and further guarantee success in her new business endeavor. Martha hired servant girls, working class women like her, to guarantee her customers quality service and customer satisfaction.

With a successful business in operation, and her floor length hair as her primary advertisement, Martha saw the opportunity in her business growing. Rather than open more shops, Martha decided in 1892 to give ownership opportunities to her employees. In 1891 the first franchised business shop was opened on Buffalo, New York. More than 500 Harper Method Shops were opened in the United States and overseas during Martha's lifetime.

Martha's philosophy of beauty was based on good health and natural products to bring out the beauty in everyone. Martha's publication, the *Harper Method Textbook*, describes the course material covered in her training classes. The new franchise owners were taught the "Harper Method" and were called "Harperites." Her method was based on teaching scientific principles of cleanliness, stimulation, and exercise. Only Harper methods and Harper products were used in the business. Martha, in her constant quest for customer satisfaction, invented the reclining shampoo chair and the basin with a depression for the neck. However, Martha did not patent her invention and thus is not given legal recognition for it. Martha did patent her secret hair tonic, "*Moscaro Tonique*," which gave her business its initial start.

By holding Harper Method reunions and continuing educational training sessions, Martha was able to maintain a loyal and supportive workforce. Monthly magazines/newsletters not only kept the franchise owners informed of business matters but also established a close family relationship among the owners, operators and staff of the Beauty School.

Establishing basic business principles for future business owners, Martha can be credited with promotion of excellent customer service and quality workmanship. Providing childcare centers in her shops and evening hours for her clients were innovative services that Martha established in order to increase her customer base. Hair dyes and permanents were not considered natural for health and wellbeing and therefore were prohibited by Martha. Healthful treatments for the hair and personal styling were Martha's main concern.

Martha's business philosophy was influenced by her Christian Science beliefs. In her training manual, *The Harper Method Textbook*, Martha stated that "beauty went deeper even than health and cleanliness." She believed that "human beauty is a result of proper condition of the mind as well as surface and form." To Martha, "being healthy was fundamental to being beautiful."

Martha Matilda Harper married Robert McBain in 1920 at the age of 63. Robert was 25 years younger than Martha. She appointed Robert as her executive assistant. With the marriage, Martha became a United States citizen. Later in life and with her health failing Martha appointed Robert as President. Martha's insistence on not using damaging chemical products and natural methods diminished with the advent of her husband's leadership and the changing beauty demands of the country.

Martha died in 1950, leaving sole ownership to her husband Robert. Robert sold the business in 1985 to Earl Freeze and Gerald Wunderlich. The business survived until 1972. It was then sold to a holding company for the Wilfred Academy. No other shop exists today, except for the "Harper Method Founders Shop" which remains open to this day in downtown Rochester. It is the oldest operating beauty shop in the United States.

Martha was the first woman member of the Rochester Chamber of Commerce. She also held membership with her husband in the prestigious Oak Hill Country Club. Her nationally famous clientele included Susan B. Anthony, President Calvin Coolidge who frequented her Paris shop for scalp massages, Joseph Kennedy, Jacqueline Kennedy, Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson, and George Bernard Shaw.

Martha has been honored for her outstanding contributions to the business world, to society, and to the progress and freedom of women. In October of 2003 she was inducted into the National Women's Hall of Fame. A national campaign is now in progress to honor Martha with a United States postal stamp.

Scope and Content

The majority of the collection contains many photographs, monthly magazines and newsletter, advertising media, and several miscellaneous publications relating to the Harper Method business. Of special interest is a copy of *The Harper Method Textbook*, *The Harperite*, a 1964 yearbook published by the students of the Harper Method Beauty School, a 1922 publication, *The Harper Method-The Scientific Care of the Hair and Scalp* and the *Golden Memories Anniversary Album*.

The photographs vary in size, from a snapshot to the larger professional photograph taken by local photographers such as Lodder and Campbell. Many are group photographs and are placed in folders according to their particular event. Photographs taken during the Anniversary Reunion weeks show the Harperites enjoying lawn parties at the Harper home on Culver Avenue and dinners in large hotel banquet rooms. Other photographs include individual and group photographs of Martha and her husband Captain McBain, the Harper staff, operators, training classes, and various demonstrations of hair and skin care. Folder 66 contains photographs identified after the collection was arranged. Of particular importance in the collection are photographs of Martha's original shop in the Powers building and photographs of some of the salons equipment and furniture.

The researcher will find the monthly magazine/newsletter very helpful when trying to date and connect the various pieces of information in the collection. The Harper Method Progress magazines are filed chronologically starting from the 1924 issue and continuing to the 1967 condensed newsletter version. The anniversary issues are an excellent source of history relating to the Harper Method business, and the women (and later men) who owned, trained, and worked in the many franchised shops. The early issues reflect Martha's personal touch and keen business insight.

A box of miscellaneous printed material in the collection includes relevant newspaper articles, documents, advertising supplements, shop directories, and training publications that relate to the Harper business. Also of interest is a journal listing the graduates who received their diplomas from 1940-1961 and a notebook outlining the agendas for several of the reunion weeks.

The appendix contains materials related to but not part of the Martha Matilda Harper collection.
